

### RECIPIENT OF CYNTHIA WOODS MITCHELL FUND FOR HISTORIC INTERIORS GRANT

Union Station Redevelopment Corporation (USRC) is pleased to announce that we have received a National Trust for Historic Preservation <a href="Cynthia Woods Mitchell-Fund for Historic Interiors">Cynthia Woods Mitchell-Fund for Historic Interiors</a> grant for a Historic Interior Lighting Study of Union Station. The study will document the lighting, both artificial and natural, in the interior historic spaces over the station's history. The study will commence in August 2017 and we anticipate completion by early 2018.

Initial document collection has already been undertaken by Sarah Mayersohn, USRC Document/Archive Manager, and Amani Bey, USRC Summer Historic Document Management Intern. <u>Building Conservation Associates, Inc.</u>, project consultant, will conduct fieldwork and prepare the study. USRC plans to use the study's findings to inform on future station projects.


### WEST HALL ROMAN LEGIONNAIRES FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN RAISES OVER \$40,000

#### **UNION STATION TOURS**

Recently, USRC has received several requests for tours of the station. Here are the highlights:

#### Atlas Obscura Tour

On July 16, 2017, in collaboration with <u>Atlas Obscura</u> and the National Trust for Historic Preservation (NTHP), USRC President and CEO Beverley Swaim-Staley and Archivist Sarah Mayersohn led a group of 26 people on a behind the scenes tour of Union Station. In addition to stops in the West, East, and Main Halls, the participants were taken to areas usually not accessible to the general public, including:

- the Presidential Suite,
- the balcony area to see the Roman Legionnaires up close, and
- the H Street Bridge underpass.

The tour participants really enjoyed learning about the station and its history. Many thanks to all who attended. Atlas Obscura, NTHP, and USRC are planning another tour in the fall.



#### WTS Tour

On June 23rd, USRC hosted a <u>Women's Transportation Seminar</u> (WTS) group in Union Station. Taking part were 27 young women from Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, DC, Georgia, Illinois, Minnesota, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Washington who are all interested in STEM-related careers. The participants were selected through an application process by their WTS chapters. Additionally, there were 26 chaperones/mentors from the academia, construction, engineering, and transportation sectors. USRC staff gave an overview of Union Station and their career paths, after which they took the WTS group on a tour of the station.



#### **Girl Scouts Tour**

On June 4, 2017, USRC President and CEO Beverley Swaim-Staley hosted a group from the Girl Scout Council of the Nation's Capital (GSCNC) at Union Station. GSCNC CEO Lidia Soto-Harmon, 2 product sales staff, and 13 members, who were top cookie entrepreneurs (collectively selling over 36,000 packages of cookies), enjoyed lunch at Shake Shack and then were taken on a tour of the Main and East Halls and the Presidential Suite. The young ladies were quite impressed that there is real gold on the ceiling in the Main Hall. The outing ended with a ride on the streetcar. The Girl Scouts had a great time learning about the beautiful, historic station.

#### AMTRAK AND USRC INDUSTRY OPEN HOUSE

On June 8th, <u>Amtrak</u> and USRC hosted an Industry Open House for upcoming Union Station projects which seek to double passenger and train capacity by modernizing and expanding station facilities over the coming decades.
